## Agency Updates

Accreditation - The concern I reported at the last meeting with indicator 5.1 in the Immunization program has been settled. The Agency received a "Met with Conditions" on this indicator.

Budget Amendment - The budget amendment reviewed by the Finance Committee is before the full Board today for action. This amendment fixes the known issues when the last budget amendment was accepted and keeps the Agency on target without using fund balance.

Local Appropriations Request - The Agency is requesting an additional $\$ 0.15$ per capita increase for the next fiscal year. This request is made considering factors that include; the MERS Defined Benefit costs continue to increase, the Agency is still below the fund balance "floor" as resolved by the Board, and future health care costs are unknown at this time.

Temporary Food Service Policy - Paul and his staff have crafted a policy to address issues with the temporary food service program. There will be a phase-in period should the policy be adopted by the Board.

Congregate Meal Enhancement - The enhancement will allow Community Action to develop a meal voucher program similar to the program in St. Joseph County. As you know, CA moved their congregate site this year and has seen a drop-in participation with the move. Allowing CA to be creative with the hope to increase the number of meals served will help them better meet the needs of seniors in Branch County. AAA 3C's federal funding "NSIP" is based on the number of meals served and to capture the maximum amount of funding this program enhancement is needed.

Request for Proposals - We have released an RFP for an Electronic Medical Record system and plan to release an RFP for EH software in the next week. The Agency's current EMR (CMHC) is no longer supported and we can only use it for scheduling and Medicaid billing. We need an upgrade that will allow us to streamline billing and the entire client data flow. EH currently uses a private vendor software program for our food program, and a mix of Access databases and document management software for our well and septic programs. A software that brings all EH programs under one system and streamlines the process of application through permit or report delivery is badly needed. Money has been set-aside in anticipation of these expenses. I will continue to keep you informed of our progress.

PFAS Testing - The State has begun an initiative to sample community water supplies and the water supplies for schools on their own water supply for PFAS. PFAS has been classified by the UPEPA as an emerging contaminant; which means they present real or potentially unacceptable human health risks and do not have peer-reviewed human health standards. PFAS are a class of chemicals historically used throughout the industrial, food, and textile industries. PFAS have been used in firefighting foams, food packaging, cleaning products, and various other products. They are incredibly stable, breaking down very slowly in the environment; and are highly soluble, easily transferring through soil to groundwater. I am reviewing the State's toolkit for this contaminant as we prepare to respond should PFAS be found locally. The DEQ issued the following press release this week about the statewide sampling protocol:

## Michigan embarks on statewide study of PFAS in water supplies

The Michigan PFAS Action Response Team (MPART) today announced plans to conduct a state-wide study of per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) levels in public water supplies. The $\$ 1.7$ million survey is the first comprehensive, state-driven study of its kind.

PFAS compounds are a group of emerging and potentially harmful contaminants used in thousands of applications globally including firefighting foam, food packaging, and many other consumer products. These compounds also are used by industries such as tanneries, metal platers, and clothing manufacturers.

The Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) this week began sending out letters to Michigan's 1,380 public water systems outlining the water testing study which will be administered by the MDEQ. The goal is to complete this statewide study by the end of 2018.

In addition to public water systems, some 461 schools that operate their own wells will be considered priority testing sites under the study. Roughly 75 percent of the state's drinking water comes from public systems.

In January 2018, the MDEQ acted to set a new clean-up standard of less than 70 parts per trillion for PFAS in groundwater used for drinking water. PFAS chemicals include perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) and perfluorooctanesulfonic acid (PFOS). Michigan is one of only a handful of states to establish a clean-up standard.
"Michigan has moved quickly to protect people from potentially unsafe drinking water in communities with known PFAS contamination from historical industrial or military activities," said MDEQ Director C. Heidi Grether. "MPART is taking this next proactive step to survey other parts of the state and gather important baseline data on the presence of this emerging contaminant in the environment."

MPART is helping to coordinate the state's $\$ 23$ million effort to locate PFAS contamination, identify sources, and oversee remediation activities aimed at protecting the state's water resources and mitigating risks to the public.

The state has already sampled water at more than 30 including industrial, military, and landfill sites known to have used or disposed of PFAS-containing materials and acted to protect drinking water supplies. In addition to these sites, many larger water systems serving multiple communities - like those in greater Detroit, Saginaw, and Grand Rapids - already sample for PFAS.
"Although acceptable PFAS exposure levels continue to be debated nationally, the right thing to do here in Michigan is advance our knowledge of this emerging contaminant," said MPART Director Carol Isaacs. "We will share what we learn with the public and are prepared to advise communities, if necessary, on steps they can take to reduce PFAS levels in their water supplies."

Although private residential wells are not within the scope of the study, information on independent testing and filtering options is available from MPART at www.michigan.gov/PFASresponse.

Staff Vacancies/New Staff - I would like to introduce Yvonne Atwood who has accepted the position as Director of Personal Health \& Disease Prevention. Yvonne was previously the Hillsdale Clinic Coordinator and was in charge of the Agency's WIC program. She began her new duties on Monday. Next week we will welcome a new Breastfeeding Peer in our Coldwater office. The Agency has three positions posted; an opening in the Coldwater office for a part-time support staff, an opening in the St. Joseph County office for a clinic clerk tech., and the Hillsdale Clinic Coordinator position.

Hepatitis A Outbreak - As I have been reporting, Michigan is in the midst of a serious Hepatitis A outbreak. Current case count as of May 16, 2018 is 836 with 671 hospitalizations and 27 deaths. The Agency has ramped up our vaccination efforts to the high-risk groups and we have shared a "coupon" with other service providers to share with their clients that is designed to "drive" people into the health department for vaccination.

Hepatitis A vaccination is safe and effective. The following individuals should get the HAV vaccine:

- Persons who are homeless.
- Persons who are incarcerated.
- Persons who use injection and non-injection illegal drugs.
- Persons who work with the high risk populations listed above.
- Persons who have close contact, care for, or live with someone who has HAV.
- Persons who have sexual activities with someone who has HAV.
- Men who have sex with men.
- Travelers to countries with high or medium rates of HAV.
- Persons with chronic liver disease, such as cirrhosis, hepatitis B, or hepatitis C.*
- Persons with clotting factor disorders.

## Numbered Infectious Diseases of Childhood

In the late $19^{\text {th }}$ century and before a better knowledge of infectious disease and access to immunization to prevent contagious illness children suffered a series of infectious diseases. Around the turn of the century, pediatricians gave numbers to the 4 prevalent infectious diseases associated with rash. For the child growing up on the prairie they suffered a series of diseases that came in an order of their exposure. ${ }^{1}$ Fifth and sixth disease were $20^{\text {th }}$ century updates on the numbered exanthams.

The Numbered Diseases of Childhood

| First disease | Rubeola (hard measles) |
| :--- | :--- |
| Second disease | Scarlet fever |
| Third disease | Rubella (3-day measles) |
| Fourth disease | Filatov-Dukes disease (never well defined) |
| Fifth disease | Erythema infectiousum (slapped cheeks rash) |
| Sixth disease | Roseola |

Smallpox was known since 1796 and was the first disease to have a vaccine for prevention. Cholera, rabies, tetanus, typhoid and plague were common diseases in the $18^{\text {th }}$ and $19^{\text {th }}$ centuries. Immunizations were developed to help reduce the infectivity rate of these diseases because they were highly contagious and significantly fatal.

Before immunizations, Smallpox was highly lethal and killed about $25-35$ percent of those infected. ${ }^{2}$ The slave trade brought measles to Nicaragua in the 1500's and over half of the native population succumbed to the disease. ${ }^{3}$ For measles, over 90 percent of non-immune patients will get the disease after droplet exposure. The disease affects the respiratory system and brain and measles pneumonia still has about a 30 percent mortality today.

Before the advent of penicillin, scarlet fever was associated with family mortalities where all the children in a family succumbed to the disease. Epidemics were common where the infection would spread throughout a town. During the Civil War, a scarlet fever epidemic in 1861 was declared the worst human disaster in Fredericksburg history.

Advances in scientific technology and public health concerns lead to development of vaccines and antibiotics to fight the infections afflicting large segments of the population. This is why we do not see the epidemics in the US common to those of the $19^{\text {th }}$ century and some of which are still present in third world countries today where access to vaccination is lacking.

Those not recognizing the importance of history are doomed to repeat it is an appropriate phrase for our population that chooses not to immunize themselves or their children. The re-emergence of measles in the US and increased presence of pertussis in our community are testimony to this. Not
immunizing children against HPV exposes them to the potential of getting a fatal cancer, preventable by immunization. Not allowing immunization against HPV is an example of ineffective and dangerous parenting.

Education of the public is the most effective means of reducing the prevalence of infections preventable by immunization. All health care providers are responsible to do this.

## TEMPORARY FOOD LICENSE POLICY

The Branch-Hillsdale-St. Joseph Community Health Agency (BHSJCHA) strives to accommodate temporary food applicants with timely permitting and inspection. Many temporary food operations take place outside of regular business hours; therefore, to accommodate our clients efficiently, we need to have as much advance notice as possible so our staff can make arrangements to adjust work schedules.

To facilitate this, the following policy has been established:

1. Application Receipt
a. applications must be received at the Health Department 10 calendar days prior to the event
b. applications received less than $\mathbf{1 0}$ calendar days prior to the event but more than 2 business days will be assessed the late fee as published in the fee schedule
c. applications received less than $\mathbf{2}$ business days prior to the event, by mail or in person, will not be licensed and may not operate.
2. Inspection Time
a. "Serving Start Time" on the application must reflect when the operation will be set up and ready for inspection
b. a BHSJCHA food staff member will contact the applicant in advance to verify this time
c. operations not set-up and ready for inspection at the agreed upon "Serving Start Time" will not be licensed and will not be allowed to operate
d. an applicant is not eligible for a refund of the license fee
3. Non-Profits
a. BHSJCHA offers a discounted fee for non-profits
b. Beginning, January 1, 2019, applicants requesting the non-profit discounted fee must provide written documentation that demonstrates they meet requirements for non-profits established by the internal revenue code at the time of application.

Re: Branch County Congregate Meal Program Enhancement

As you know Community Action is serving Congregate Meals for older adults in Branch County four days each week at Coldwater Church of Christ. We feel that this site serves the greater Coldwater area but would like to expand the Congregate Meal Program and increase dining options throughout the county by initiating a voucher program for Congregate Meals. The idea of a voucher program came from previous discussions with AAA staff and a review of other options provided in other counties. We would like to begin a restaurant voucher congregate meal option as soon as possible. After discussing a timeline with AAA staff, we have selected June $1^{\text {st }}$ as our target date. Your review and input regarding the program enhancement is appreciated.

The restaurant voucher congregate meal enhancement will not change the total contract units or the cost per unit reimbursement to Community Action. We see the restaurant voucher meal option increasing options and serving a larger geographic portion of the County. It would create new avenues for private/public partnership between Community Action and the business community as well.

We have reviewed congregate voucher programs in other communities and are modeling our proposal closely after the one offered in St. Joseph County. We would meet all required state and federal meal program standards and keep the same donation request of $\$ 3.00 /$ meal. Currently, we have two restaurants in Union City that are interested, including Broadway Grill and The Bucket. Restaurants that would like to participate would need to demonstrate that they can meet the health department and federal/state standards. We also plan to recruit and add restaurants in other areas of the county to more comprehensively serve Branch County.

The current contract for 4,000 congregate meals will remain in place. Under the voucher plan an eligible participant could receive seven meal vouchers per month. We anticipate serving 40-50 people through this program each month, for a total monthly circulation of 280-350 vouchers/month. Registration would be done at our

Branch County Office or by appointment. We estimate that approximately $75 \%$ of these vouchers will be redeemed before they expire. We will be evaluating and possibly adjusting the amount of vouchers distributed each month in order to meet program/contract objectives. We also estimate that the voucher program will initially comprise of $7 \%$ of the congregate budget.

We have been closely monitoring the trends in service participation between Home Delivered and Congregate Meals. When final full-year funding for FY 2017-18 is announced, we will be working closely with AAA Staff to look at programmatic needs and access to services where it is needed to better align any available funds for Branch County meals. A Voucher Program will help us to offer more choice, to a wider audience within the community and give us a better chance to meet our contract obligations.

We appreciate the Program, Policy \& Appeals Committee's time and review of our program enhancement. AAA Staff have advised us that the Committees' review and approval is required first, before a formal presentation to the full Board of Health. We will hope to see you at your May 24 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ Board Meeting. In the meantime, I'd be happy to answer any questions you may have by contacting me at the phone number or email noted above.

## Update as of May 17, 2018:

We have determined to work on the restaurants in the areas outside of Coldwater first because we currently have a dining site in Coldwater to serve residents, and the outer county area does not have easy access to services. This will also allow Community Action time to work out the service option and learn how to best provide the service in an area of the county that will not have high volume originally. Our plan is to expand into all areas of the county, or at least approach potential restaurants in all areas of the county who can meet the requirements. This process will happen over time, but our plan would be to have at least one restaurant participating in Quincy, Union City and Coldwater by September.

We have received word that The Bucket will not be participating for personal reasons. We have identified two additional restaurants, one in Quincy and one in Bronson that we will be contacting in the next week.

We will attend the board meeting to answer any questions the board may have.

## Food Service Sanitation

The food staff has been busy with the food license renewal process. Most of our operators are very good at getting their license applications back in a timely manner but we are always challenged with tracking down a number of operators at the last minute with phone call and in person reminders to ensure they get their license renewed. We had one situation this year where even after several
 phone conversations and personal visits to the establishment, the owner did not provide the license renewal application and associated fee so we were forced to close the establishment due to a lack of a food license.

## Well \& On-Site Sewage

Well and septic system applications have been coming in at a very fast pace in St. Joseph County since the weather has broken. The numbers have not reflected that yet in the monthly statistics, however, the heavy influx of work will show up in the coming months. Branch and Hillsdale counties seem to be staying at a very steady pace as reflected from the numbers from 2016/2017.

## General Programs

Spring has arrived and with that we are starting to get busy with the seasonal operations such as outdoor swimming pools and campgrounds. Our Type II community water coordinator gets very busy this time of year working with the campgrounds as they go through the process of re-opening their water systems. Any water system that is shut down over the winter months must go through a process called seasonal start-up which requires chlorinating (disinfecting) the water system, sampling the system after disinfection and completing an associate set of paperwork.
We will also be starting some of our annual long-term water sampling that we have contracted to do for the DEQ as well as our inspections of septage hauler trucks and septage disposal sites.

## Updates:

1. Older Michiganians Day was a HUGE success!! Even though Region 3C only had one "formal" advocate, we made valuable contacts with Senator Shirkey, Representative Leutheuser, and Representative Miller. Our main talking points included:

- Strong advocacy for AASA (state) revenue to support in-home services
- The need to address the direct care worker shortage
- Waiting lists in our planning \& service area
- The impact of family caregivers, and, the impact when individuals do not have family caregivers
- Highlights about the VOCA "Elder Abuse Victim Services Grant" that our agency submitted
All of our elected officials were very supportive of our grant application and requested a copy of the proposal itself. They were also very encouraged and asked to eat at one of the restaurants that CA is developing agreements with in Branch County for the Voucher Program (Sen. Shirkey). Overall, we are grateful for the time and dynamic conversations we had!

2. We have a federal budget, yet are still awaiting a Statement of Grant Award... We will do our best to prepare amendments in time for the June meeting. Rebecca and I will keep the Board informed of the timeline and process.
3. The Fiscal Year 2019 Annual Implementation Plan DRAFT is available! The Public Hearing is immediately following the BOH meeting today at 11:00am. The Plan has been shared with all aging network partners. I will be presenting the Plan to Branch County Commissioners at their June $7^{\text {th }}$ working meeting and with St. Joseph County Commissioners at their June 19th regular meeting. The Advisory Committee was updated yesterday on the following main highlights:

- AASA issued budget targets include a $7 \%$ reduction in all federal sources.
- Program Development objectives were updated to reflect our ongoing work in each county.
- The continuum of services funded by federal and state dollars remains unchanged
