Letter to the Community

As Public Health Officer for Branch, Hillsdale, and St. Joseph Counties, I am pleased and honored to present the Annual Report highlighting your local health department's accomplishments for the Fiscal Year 2003/2004.

The Community Health Agency's continued success in providing for the benefits of public health protection, prevention, and health promotion is a reflection of the dedicated work of the agency's well trained and experienced staff as well as the commitment and support from the County Boards of Commissioners in each County.

During Fiscal Year 2003/2004 the District Board of Health formally conducted a strategic planning session to update the agency's mission and value statements and affirm the agency's vision statement. Through this process the District Board of Health reviewed the trend analysis of the social, technical, political, and economic environments that the agency must operate in. A strategic plan was developed that defines the agency's focus areas for the next 3 years.

During Fiscal Year 2003/2004 the agency was the lead agency in conducting an emergency disease outbreak drill where the public's health and safety was threatened and the Strategic National Stockpile was deployed. The two-hour drill was a success. The agency was one of the first local health departments in the state to conduct such a drill. The management and staff of the agency were well prepared and effective.

During Fiscal Year 2003/2004 the agency initiated and continued negotiations with Borgess Health Alliance to be included in the emerging Southwest Michigan TeleHealth video-conferencing network of regional hospitals, clinics, and local health departments. Once operational, access to this network will assist professionals in our local communities in gaining access to wide-ranging regional, state, and national training and conferencing opportunities.

During Fiscal Year 2003/2004 the agency joint-sponsored a press conference and educational session highlighting the plight of people locally that lack health insurance or are underinsured. At that press conference the agency announced the formation of an Access to Health Care Task Force. This task force has been charged to assess the need, identify solutions, and facilitate community action regarding this issue.

During Fiscal Year 2003/2004 the agency dealt effectively with the national flu vaccine supply shortage. Agency personnel worked tirelessly to increase the availability of flu vaccine locally by brokering, purchasing, and when needed, begging for additional flu vaccine from outside public and private vendors.

It seems an established fact that local public health departments will always be under-funded and under-valued as a community resource, until it does not exist to protect the public. Nonetheless, it is our agency's goal that we will continue to work diligently and effectively to fulfill our mission and obligation to the communities that we serve.



- ▶ The SAFE KIDS Chapter received \$5,800 in grant funding and \$4,736 from in-kind donations.

- ▶ The CHA, in collaboration with the Family Services Network, performed a community assessment of Branch County called "SNAPSHOT", including a community survey of nearly 2,000 county residents. The SNAPSHOT assessment will be used for future community planning and development of service priorities.

Administrative role for an autonomous network office that provides multiple activities and education programs that reduce the financial and medical burden of diabetes to the individual, community, and health care provider.






